#### **UMCOR HYGIENE KIT**

The United Methodist Women (UMW) of CPFUMC will be collecting items for Hygiene Kits for UMCOR during the month of May. Please see the lists on the bulletin board and the collection box for items or money to support this project.

**Hygiene kits** provide basic necessities to people who have been forced to leave their homes because of human conflict or natural disaster. Hygiene kits are also used as learning tools in personal hygiene, literacy, nutrition, and cooking classes.

- One hand towel (15 x 25 –17 x 27 inches)
  - No kitchen, cleaning, or microfiber towels
- One washcloth
- One comb
  - Must be sturdy with at least 6 inches of teeth
  - No pocket combs or picks
  - Rattail & combs without handles are acceptable but must have at least 6 inches of teeth
- One toenail or fingernail clipper
  - No emery boards or metal nail files

### **Important Notes**

- All items must be new.
- o Do not wash any of the items as they will no longer be considered new.
- o Do not include any personal notes, money or additional materials in the kits.
- Contents of kits or the containers of kits should not be imprinted with cartoon characters, advertisements, religious, patriotic, military or camouflage symbols
- Please send a check for the total amount of hygiene kits times \$2 per kit for the cost of toothpaste and shipping to Sager Brown. One check may be written for all of the kits.

2018 UPCOMING EVENTS MAKE PLANS

#### PARK STREET FRONTAGE LANDSCAPE PROJECT

One of the Trustees goals for 2018 is to improve our care of God's creation and gifts to us. We started the recycle project to work toward this goal. Another step along this journey is to landscape our property along our Park Street frontage.

When we finished the parking lot project in 2016, we realized that not only did we have adequate parking, but we also had some inviting landscaping bordering the parking lot to attract people who drive by. The parking lot landscaping is in sharp contrast with the existing landscaping farther to the west along Park Street.

Some of the goals of this landscape project are

- Blend well with our existing landscaping on our property along Park Street.
- It needs to eliminate the mud problem for parking in the MMB parking lot.
- It needs to shield the 4 HVAC units from view from Park St.
- All native live oak trees and large pine tree are to be retained.
- Any plants, trees and shrubs to be added should be native varieties, drought tolerant and deer resistant.
- Our goal is to make our Park Street frontage an inviting view from the road.
- Screen the shed from Park Street as much as possible while allowing for clear access to the shed front door.

The Trustees have solicited a landscaping plan for our Park Street frontage west of the main parking lot. Blair Landscape Architecture, LLC, the same firm that landscaped the parking lot

# OCT 18-21 POSAUNENCHOR IS COMING! HOST HOMES NEEDED

What is Posaunenchor, anyway? Posaunenchor is a German word made, as the Germans like to do, by sticking two words together: Posaunen means "trumpet" or "trombone" and chor means "choir." So Posaunenchor means "trumpet choir" or "trombone choir" or "brass choir."

About 4 months from now, October 18-21, 2018, we will have a visit from a Posaunenchor from Hamm, Germany. They will be coming to Cedar Park First UMC to play at our worship services that weekend and also to play a concert at Highland Estates. This will be a wonderful opportunity for a cultural exchange. Our plan if to provide some Hill Country hospitality by providing accommodations for the band members in our homes and sharing a couple of meals and some Austin sightseeing with them while they are here.

We expect a group of about 20 to 30 musicians with ages from 12 to 62. Our German guests are pretty self-sufficient. All of them speak some English, most of them quite well. This is an opportunity for an informal cultural exchange. More information will be forthcoming as October nears.

### **RIO TEXAS OFFERS HURRICANE RECOVERY TOUR**

- "The restaurant is gone!" the retired United Methodist missionary said. "Oh, my gosh. We used to come over here all the time."
- Wright's dismay at not finding a favored seafood place from her years of living in and near Corpus Christi, Texas, came during a two-hour driving tour offered by the Rio Texas Conference during its recent annual gathering.
- The purpose was to show that damage remains from last year's **<u>Hurricane Harvey</u>**, and that United Methodist volunteers continue to be needed.
- "We get questions all the time, people saying, 'You're still doing Harvey recovery? Aren't all those people home?'" said Vicki McCuistion, disaster recovery asset manager for the Rio Texas Conference. "This is an opportunity to drive the streets and show them that, no, not everybody is home."
- The Rio Texas Conference and Texas Conference both were still responding to flood-related needs of recent years when Hurricane Harvey hit on Aug. 25, 2017, ultimately causing 88 deaths and more than \$125 billion in damage.
- The storm's torrential aftermath in Houston and nearby East Texas communities drew most of the media attention, thanks to searing images of flooding and <u>rescues by the Cajun Navy</u> and other volunteers, <u>including United Methodists.</u>
- But the hurricane first clobbered select parts of the Texas coast just north of Corpus Christi, with severe wind damage extending well inland. **Fourteen counties** within the vast Rio Texas Conference have seen some 118,000 FEMA registrations. And the damage, while intermittent, ranges far and wide.
- "The most difficult thing to deal with is how widespread it is," said Gene Hileman, Rio Texas Conference disaster relief coordinator.
- First United Methodist Church in Victoria, Texas, has been a center of Harvey-related volunteer work. Its pastor, the Rev. Timothy Brewer, estimates that 3,000 to 4,000 homes locally had damage not covered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency or private insurance.
- "I think we've completed (restoration of) something like 500 of those homes," Brewer said.
- The Rio Texas Conference is working closely with the <u>United Methodist Committee on Relief</u>, which <u>at its April</u> meeting approved grants of \$4.8 million to the Texas Conference and \$5 million to the Rio Texas Conference.
- UMCOR is one of five members of <u>National Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster</u> to be chosen to work with FEMA and the state of Texas in <u>Project Comeback: Texas</u>, a first-of-its-kind collaboration aimed at more coordinated response.
- The specific task for UMCOR is to train case managers for Harvey recovery work. The Rio Texas Conference and the nonprofit group Hope Disaster Recovery will help implement case management services.
- "Our long history of providing disaster case management services that empower survivors to lead their own recovery is what makes UMCOR's work unique," said Cathy Earl, UMCOR director for U.S. disaster response.
- Rio Texas has case managers and supervisors in place, helping clients with financing and identifying reliable contractors, as well as finding volunteer labor when possible. First United Methodist of Victoria and First United

- Methodist of Sinton, Texas, are "volunteer villages," with bunk beds, showers and kitchens. From almost the beginning, the Victoria church has housed volunteers, though it lost a roof and had water damage from the storm. "We've had somewhere over 1,000 people spending the night in our building," Brewer said of the nine months since Harvey. "We expect 800 more in June and July."
- The connectional nature of United Methodism has been on display, with equipment coming from as far as the California-Pacific Conference, and volunteer teams arriving from around the state and well beyond.
- The <u>June 6-8 Rio Texas Conference gathering in Corpus Christi</u> was the first since the hurricane, and a chance to tout all the recovery work done or underway. A <u>video shown to delegates</u> included emotional testimonies from people who are back in their homes thanks to the conference's leveraging of volunteers and financial resources.
- But the ongoing need for volunteers and donations, including from within the conference, led to the idea of a Harvey recovery tour as part of the annual meeting.
- On June 7, about 30 people devoted their lunch break to climbing into one of two church vans and heading out with Rio Texas officials for a drive to Aransas Pass and Rockport—two hard-hit communities just north of Corpus Christi. Along the way, they saw businesses boarded up or under reconstruction, as well as vacant lots where businesses operated before Harvey. In residential areas, there was more of the same, with van riders remarking on how many new roofs there were, and how many blue tarps indicating the roof was still to come.
- At First United Methodist of Aransas Pass, the group got a briefing from McCuistion and Sophie Longoria, a case management supervisor. They also met case management workers based at the church. One of those, Amy Collins, noted that life goes on for those waiting to get back in their homes.
- "There's deaths in the family, there's divorce, there's sickness," she said. "All that's going on in the midst of (them) trying to recover. Those are the stories that get to you."
- From McCuistion, the group heard that volunteer numbers are strong now, thanks in part to youth groups. "**August** is available for anyone who wants to come," she said. "We have lots of space available in the volunteer villages through the fall and spring."
- The Rev. Daniel Flores was among those on the tour. He's an elder in the Rio Texas Conference, but he's living in the North Texas Conference, doing extension ministry at a community college. He'd followed the Harvey story closely through the news. "Now I have an opportunity to see firsthand the recovery effort at nine months, and get a better idea of what I might contribute," he said.
- Wright planned to return to her current home town of New Braunfels, Texas, and let United Methodist churches there know what she saw and how they might be helpful. She'll go with a sense of gratitude for United Methodists at work already. "They're doing what we're supposed to do, being the hands and feet of Jesus."

### JUNE 19TH JUNETEENTH

- Each year on June 19, Texans commemorate the day news of the abolition of slavery reached the Lone Star State.
- The Emancipation Proclamation, which abolished slavery, went into effect on Jan. 1, 1863. Texas was the last state to end slavery, abolishing it when Union General Gordon Granger came to Galveston with the announcement more than two years later.
- It was not until the end of the Civil War, when the Confederacy was defeated, that Texans learned of the Proclamation, said Benjamin Wright, associate director for communications at the Dolph Briscoe Center for American History.
- "Juneteenth celebrates when this news came to Texas," said Wright, a history graduate student. "It's not just the news of freedom, but actually the reality of it."
- Wright said even though the former slaves were then free, they faced a plethora of other challenges, such as financial hardships and the inability to obtain land.
- "In Texas, and in other southern states, there were several generations of slaves working on this land," Wright said. "It was the sweat of their brows, their broken bodies, that had made the land profitable."
- At the time of Granger's announcement, there were more than 250,000 slaves in Texas. Juneteenth is a portmanteau of "June" and "nineteenth," and the day is the oldest-known celebration commemorating the end of slavery in the United States.
- In **1980**, Texas became the first state to recognize Juneteenth as an official state holiday through the efforts of Texas state Rep. Al Edwards, D-Houston.
- "Every year, we must remind successive generations that this event triggered a series of events that, one by one, defines the challenges and responsibilities of successive generations," said Edwards, sponsor of the bill, according to CNN. "That's why we need this holiday."
- People celebrate Juneteenth with parades, rodeos, street fairs, cookouts, historical reenactments and "Miss Juneteenth" contests. Some other traditions include oral histories and readings of the Emancipation Proclamation.

Emancipation Parks, in both Austin and Houston, were purchased specifically for Juneteenth celebrations. Now, Austin's Juneteenth celebration occurs in Rosewood Park, and the land where Emancipation Park was became the first African-American public housing complex in the country.

"The economic, social and political climate for African-Americans in Texas was precarious and dangerous," said Nakia Parker, a history and African and African Diaspora studies graduate student. "It was a remarkable and brave thing to buy land to celebrate Juneteenth so openly, to say the least."

Although the day is seen as the end of slavery in the United States, Juneteenth is still not a national holiday. Parker said she thinks Juneteenth is celebrated more locally than nationally because the conception of slavery being a brutal institution that only occurred in the South. "The more frank discussions we have about slavery being an integral part of American history ... the more Juneteenth will be more likely recognized like other celebrations," Parker said.

#### June 16-21 Pope Francis, Koreans to attend WCC gathering

GENEVA (UMNS) — United Methodists will be among those present when the pope and a Christian delegation from North and South Korea take part in the June 16-21 meeting of the World Council of Churches' Central Committee at the WCC's headquarters. The visit by Pope Francis on June 21 also includes a large public mass.

United Methodists will be among those present when the council's governing body meets at the WCC headquarters in Geneva. Retired United Methodist Bishop Mary Ann Swenson, who serves as co-vice moderator, is the denomination's top representative to the council.
