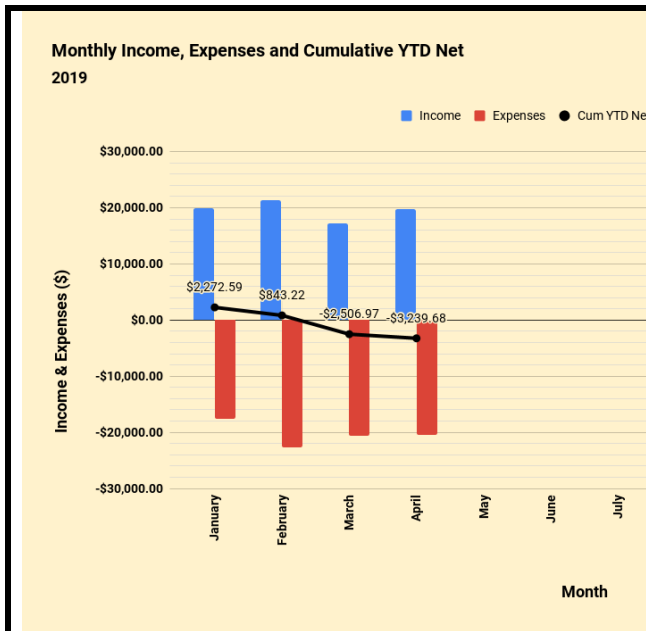

Explanation

The chart depicts monthly income and expenses for the church using solid blue and solid red bars.

The net for a given month is the income minus the expenses for that month.

The cumulative net is indicated by the solid black line. It is the year-to-date (YTD) summation of all the monthly nets.

If the Cum YTD Net is above zero, that means we are running a surplus to date.

If the Cum YTD Net is negative, that means we are running a deficit to date.

"What can I do about the environment? What has God said about the environment?" Most books about climate change only address one of these questions. Those from a religious perspective do not address what individuals can do to help society transition from fossil fuels, other than changing personal behavior. In contrast, books that primarily address environmental issues fail to reach people motivated more by faith than science, leaving out many who could constitute the tipping point for full American engagement on the issue.

When disasters happen, it is local churches that provide the first response to their communities. This basic understanding – that disaster response is local – forms the foundation for UMCOR's U.S. disaster training and response efforts. When responding to a disaster in the United States, UMCOR works with the conference disaster response ministries to provide the following:

- Financial assistance - emergency grants may be sent when a bishop of the affected conference contacts UMCOR;
- Expertise - UMCOR's disaster-response experience and knowledge are made available to those in need;
- Networking - connections with NGOs, volunteers, experts, local government and other organizations can help communities recover from disaster.

Current Disaster Response

UMCOR and its partners are responding to disasters in the United States every day. Active Responses

Tornadoes and flooding in Oklahoma

UMCOR has awarded \$10,000 solidarity grants to both the Oklahoma Conference and the Oklahoma Indian Missionary Conference. The conferences are conducting assessments as areas become accessible, setting up staging areas for volunteer teams to be accommodated and preparing to accept Early Response Teams. UMCOR is in close communication with the conferences as the response continues to unfold.

Severe weather in the midwestern United States

UMCOR remains in close connection with the annual conferences responding to the effects of severe weather this Spring in the midwestern United States. Assessments and support are ongoing in the Iowa, Dakotas, Great Plains, Wisconsin and Mountain Sky conferences.

UMCOR awarded \$10,000 solidarity grants and supported Early Response Teams with "Train the Trainer" courses for many of these conferences. Volunteers continue to help in numerous ways: muck out operations, debris removal, supporting temporary shelter operations and working with local partners on next steps in recovery.

Severe weather in the southeastern United States

In states such as Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and Florida, disaster preparedness training equipped conferences and churches to respond effectively to tornadoes and flooding. Solidarity grants were awarded, Emergency Response Teams and relief supply distribution were deployed, case management is underway and assessments for recovery efforts are ongoing.

Ongoing Response

Wildfires in California (2017-18)

UMCOR supported the California-Pacific and California-Nevada annual conferences as they responded to the needs of those affected by the devastating wildfires of 2017 and 2018. Grants were awarded totaling over \$1.5 million for response and recovery ministries. UMCOR training and consultation is ongoing.

Hurricane Michael (2018)

UMCOR partners are continuing their local recovery in response to Hurricane Michael in the Alabama-West Florida, South Georgia and Florida annual conferences. UMCOR solidarity grants were awarded to support initial response efforts in the Alabama-West Florida and Florida conferences. Additionally, recovery grants were approved in the amounts of \$118,271 for the Florida Conference and \$617,368 for the Alabama-West Florida Conference to support vital survivor services, including disaster case management, reconstruction and volunteer coordination. UMCOR is supporting these conferences as they develop and plan to resource their long-term recovery programs.

Hurricane Florence (2018)

UMCOR awarded \$10,000 solidarity grants to the North Carolina and South Carolina annual conferences to support response efforts. Recovery grants were approved in the amounts of \$825,050 for South Carolina and \$1,428,000 for North Carolina to support vital survivor services, including disaster case management, reconstruction and volunteer coordination. In the North Carolina and South Carolina conferences, recovery programs were launched in January 2019. UMCOR continues to support these conferences with training, consultation and further development.

Hurricane Maria (2017)

From the outset of the storm, UMCOR has worked closely with the Methodist Church of Puerto Rico to develop of a comprehensive plan for recovery. This has included support for disaster case management, direct assistance, volunteer coordination, materials and supplies, and contracted construction services. UMCOR and the MCPR are currently serving communities in 25 municipalities throughout the island. UMCOR has awarded grants and relief supplies totaling over \$20 million. Hurricane Harvey (2017)

UMCOR has awarded partners in Texas and Louisiana grants totaling over \$13.8 million to aid in the recovery of 12,603 survivors.
