
METHODIST READING CLUB

WELCOME, SUZETTE!

Be present for Pastor Suzette's first Sunday with us – July 14th . If you will be out of town on July 14th, send a note or a card welcoming her and her family.

- Wear a name tag. I'm the worst at wearing my name tag at church. But I'll be wearing one on July 14th please, do the same. We have about 100 people in worship on a typical Sunday. Wearing a name tag is an act of caring for Pastor Suzette.
- Wear a name tag. What? That again? Yes. Please remember to wear a name tag through the summer at least! Did I mention we have about 100 people in worship? Let's show all the love that we can to our pastors!
- When Bonnie told me she was accepting a Senior Pastor position at St. Luke's here in town, she mentioned she and Mark felt the hand of God was involved. The move is a big change for Mark and Bonnie, but they believe this is the best path. A little bit of God's guidance they received has fallen on us too sort of a package deal where God takes care of two things at once.

She has a strategic outlook for the Youth Program and <u>on July 14, at 5pm</u> there will be an all-hands Youth meeting (that means not just the youth, but their parents also) for an orientation meeting and potluck dinner to meet with Suzette and to look ahead to continuing all the good things Bonnie has created for the Youth, but also add a few ideas ("amendments of a perfecting nature", as we say in our house).

INFORMATION ON CHURCH VITALITY!


Exciting things are happening at Cedar Park First UMC, and this summer is already very busy:

- Our Vacation Bible School hosted about 45 children from the Church and surrounding neighborhoods. It
 was a fun experience, with sports and Bible lessons made possible by the generosity of many Church
 volunteers.
- Bonnie How and Shawn Dubler led nine Church youth on a UM Army mission helping people in Llano recover from last year's floods.
- Nancy Holmes is leading a study called "Who is my Neighbor", that provides instruction in basic conversational Spanish, especially for worship.
- Karen Bowker has started a Prayer Shawl ministry that meets weekly knitting prayer shawls for those in the Church who need our prayers.
- We continue to have lively, enriching worship services.
- And we are welcoming a new Associate Pastor, Suzette Thorpe-Johnson, who starts July 14 and will oversee youth, community outreach, and family ministry.
- All this is possible by generous Church volunteers and donors. However, as in previous years, 2019 contributions are running behind our monthly budgeted amounts. Expenditures are also running below budget. Nevertheless, we show a deficit of about \$5,700 through May.

This chart shows our monthly income and expenditures. We need about \$22,075 in monthly income, but are currently averaging \$19,350.

TAI CHI



Join us July 28 to meet the students of Tai Chi

Tai Chi (TIE-CHEE) is a graceful form of exercise that promotes Moving, Meditation, Balance, Stillness, Flexibility, Peace, Strength, Happiness, Clarity, Relief and Fun according to the brochures handed out in Tai Chi classes on Mondays at Cedar Park First United Methodist Church, where both Introduction and Beginner classes are taught.

Two classes are offered: 9:30 am Introduction and 11:00 am Beginner. The Introduction class welcomes students of all levels. Students are taught 17 of the basic movements and have a break in the middle to share a cup of tea and fellowship. The Beginner Class starts at 11 am. Students learn 108 moves. The best way to learn Tai Chi is by doing the movements. Students of all ages and conditions can learn these basic moves.

Join us 9:45am in the Sanctuary during the Sunday School hour on July 28 to meet and see a few Tai Chi moves. In fact, you will be tempted and encouraged to actually try the moves. The Austin Metro Class Schedule helps you find alternate class times and days if Mondays are not your best day to begin improving your health, by among other things, reducing stress and anxiety, through gentle exercise and stretching.

- The Commission has formed a working Committee of this group to be given the responsibility to use designated funds as needed and serve as our link to the United Methodist response to immigration and refugee programs and ministries of these areas.

Contact your US Senators and Representatives:

Although the president has signed an executive order rescinding the family separation policy, there is still great concern regarding the timing of the end of the practice, the fate of those children already separated from their families, and the fate of families who will now end up in detention together. Our JFON attorneys are telling us that families seeking to request asylum continue to encounter tremendous challenges, even when following legal processes for doing so. - Be present for court proceedings: Being a witness in the courtroom is a powerful tool in the service of some of the most vulnerable people in our midst. Those few of us who have had the good fortune to be in the court have noticed how the presence of "outsiders" has an impact on the judge's behavior, encourages the public defenders to do a better job, and allows the community to serve as witnesses.

If you would to join a roster of volunteers, please sign up here: http://signup.com/go/digyWSU If you show up at the court without registering, you may not be allowed to enter for the proceedings.

Once registered, the court observer would need to be able to be present in the Brownsville Federal Magistrate's Court (2nd floor, Vela Federal Courthouse, 600 East Harrison, Brownsville) or in the McAllen Magistrate's Court 1701 U.S. 83 Business #1011, McAllen, TX 78501) by 10:00am or, for an afternoon shift, by 1:30pm). The observer would need to stay until the end of the proceedings. Court can run two hours or longer, but, typically, in Brownsville, they are over by noon. The most important part of the hearing is at the end, when the judge asks the immigrants if they might have anything to say-thus the need to try and stay until the end.
