How to Put Holy Back into Christmas

I just come home from shopping and all I heard through the stores are Christmas carols. On the TV you are hit in the face to buy all kinds of things for Christmas. NORTH TEXAS CONFERENCE PIE SHOP A HIT FOR SPECIAL NEEDS MINISTRY

The Pie and Coffee Shop inside Highland Park UMC is staffed by special-needs individuals and volunteers Chance Urschel was born with a neurological birth defect called Holoprosencephaly (HPE) that left him unable to talk, walk or move on his own. What it didn't affect was his outgoing personality, his zeal for life ... and the ability to make great pies.

- Urschel passed away more than three years ago on Feb. 29, 2016 at the age of 20 but his memory lives on at Chance's Pie and Coffee Shop, the newest offering of the Belong disABILITY Ministry at Highland Park UMC. The facility, which opened Sept. 15 inside the church's new Tolleson Family Activity Center, sells personal-sized and family pies apple, cherry, coconut cream as well as seasonal pies not to mention special-roast coffee and tea.
- What makes Chance's unique is that it is staffed by Belong disABILITY participants that, like their namesake, have a special need.
- "When people come in and are served a quality product, it dispels myths that [individuals with special needs] are not productive citizens – because each of them has a lot to offer," said Vance Gilmore, director of the church's Belong disABILITY Ministry. "It's uplifting to see their confidence grow. They're just like anyone else – mastering skills, putting them to use and feeling good about what they're doing."
- Chance's parents, Hal and Christi Urschel, were always trying to find things that Chance could do at home despite his physical limitations.
- "It turned out that he really enjoyed the cooking process," Chance's father, Hal Urschel, recalled in a 2017 interview with Highland Park UMC. "One of Chance's teachers taught him how to make a uniquely delicious apple pie. He would bake it from scratch, cutting up the apples and making the dough. It would take him about an hour to make a pie, and it would turn out beautiful every time."
- Said Chance's mother, Christi: "It brought him great joy to give to others. It was hard for him to try to hold onto a spoon, but we very quickly learned that it was very motivating for him to be in the kitchen and try to use a spoon to actually make a pie. He really understood that once it was finished, he was going to be able to give it to someone."
- Chance's is open from 7:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Sunday through Thursday and has a crew of three participants and two volunteers for each shift. It is patterned in part after a similar facility at The Brookwood Community, which provides spiritual, educational and vocational opportunities for adults with special needs in Brookshire, Texas, outside of Houston.
- Participants and volunteers take part in a three-week training process that focuses on three key areas: hospitality, customer service and food preparation. They work collaboratively to make pies, grind coffee beans, fulfill orders and operate the cash register.
- "It's amazing to see how quickly they not only learn tasks but also create camaraderie," manager Todd Bruning said. "For some, a job won't be an option, but we can help identify skills that God has given them and

develop the skills and confidence to work. Our hope is to place individuals into jobs that people might think are possible for those with disabilities."

- Bruning has been instrumental in developing and implementing the training process. He and his wife, Jamie, are both ordained pastors and parents to 11-year-old Nikhil, who has autism. Several years ago, Bruning took a sabbatical to study special-needs ministries in the area; in the last two years, he took another sabbatical to learn specifically what he could from Highland Park UMC.
- Finding participants for the program hasn't been difficult, as it draws attendees from the Notre Dame School, Highland Park ISD's special-education department and the church's other special-needs offerings: from Night OWLS (Night Out With Loving Sitters), which pairs special-needs children and their siblings with volunteers to give parents a night of respite, and Spotlight Academy of the Arts (which produces musical theater and short films) to special-needs Sunday School classes (The Walk) and worship service (The Feast).

Volunteers also include a pair of graduate students in occupational therapy from Texas Woman's University. It's not just about selling pies, but – to date – Chance's has served up 1,284 tasty treats. The newest venture is

another extension of Highland Park UMC's deep commitment to the special-needs community. "This church has a senior pastor [Rev. Paul Rasmussen] who always has been very dedicated in this area," Gilmore said. "His challenge all along has been to not to build spaces but to build programs. With Chance's, we're doing just that and building opportunities for so many people to be a part of."

IOWA CONFERENCE IOWA SUPERINTENDENTS, ASSISTANTS GO VIRTUAL

- DES MOINES, Iowa Iowa district superintendents and their assistants are moving from physical to virtual mobile offices on Dec. 30 to lower administrative costs.
- I give thanks to God for your faithful and effective ministries led by the Holy Spirit for the sake of Jesus Christ. You continue to find ways each day to share the love of God in Jesus Christ with your neighbors here and around the world encouraging growth in discipleship.
- District Superintendents and District Administrative Assistants will continue to have their regular phone number and email addresses as well as access to all the technology to support you in your ongoing mission and ministry for the sake of Jesus Christ. This transition will include some new way of supporting you electronically. We invite your patience and your helpful comments as we continue to improve together. We expect that the transition to the virtual offices for the district superintendents and district administrative assistants to happen around the first of December.
- The **virtual offices** for the district superintendents will also be mobile offices. Bishop Laurie Haller expects the superintendents to make regular and frequent visits with clusters of pastors and churches on their districts so they may fulfill their role as district missional strategists. This will provide your district superintendent intentional time and effort to connect pastors and churches with each other for prayer, mutual support, encouragement, and sharing best practices for connective ministry. Please contact your superintendent directly for messages, questions, and setting up an appointment with her or him:
- District administrative assistants are, as required by Federal Law, hourly employees. Traveling would unnecessarily restrict their work hours for administrative support of the districts. Their virtual office hours will be Monday through Thursday and average 10 hours per day. This will provide focused time for district administrative assistants to work together as a team to connect superintendents, pastors, and lay leadership for effective ministry. Please contact them with any messages, questions, or information that pertains to their work with you; and remember, they will be available by phone or email to assist with all of their pastors' and churches' needs.

What does this mean for clergy, laity, churches, and the ministries of the districts?

Much of what is happening now will continue with intended improvements:

- District communications through calendars and websites; and
- Support for charge/church conference profile records of clergy persons and churches.
- These two functions make up most of the work of the district administrative assistants and are the major pieces of record keeping that directly affect appointment making, church revitalization, and starts of new communities of faith.
- Clergy and laity are key partners with your district administrative assistants to make sure that these records, along with pastoral evaluation forms, salary forms (Form I), and local church ministry plans are completed in full, accurate, and turned in on time with no delays. This, along with the face-to-face visits of district superintendents and the directors of new faith communities, clergy and leadership excellence, and

congregational excellence, has the greatest potential to resource the mission and ministry of the local church in partnership with area United Methodist churches and their communities.

There will be some changes to strengthen leadership.

- The annual church/charge conference forms will be reviewed and updated so that only the essential information for the success of the local church/charge and the pastor is required.
- District committee chairpersons will need to be the primary connector for their district committee • functions (such as meetings and reports) and for their relationship to their Conference committees, boards, and agencies.
- District chairpersons and/or the district committee secretaries will need, as you always have been • expected, to send your committee minutes in a timely fashion following your meetings to your district administrative assistant for the district files.
- We will be working with the appropriate boards and agencies to streamline the grant application process so that more of the information is shared directly between the granting agency and those applying for grants rather than going through the district administrative assistants.
- Life, as well as the church as the body of Christ, is always full of transitions. Transitions can be seen as interruptions to cherished routines; yet, the simple and profound transition of the act of breathing is essential for our personal lives, like the transitional "breathing" that is prayer is essential for our lives in Christ, personally and as the church.
- Jesus encouraged his followers and us with a ready way to transition in daily faith: Ask, Seek, and Knock (Matthew 7:7-12). Jesus taught us to be curious rather than curt, search rather than subvert, and knock to open the door of communication.

By giving these young mothers the opportunity to complete their education, **acts of LOVE** is laying the foundation for their future as mothers, providers, employees, and citizens of their community.

The Refuge

The Refuge for DMST[™] (Domestic Minor Sex Trafficking) was launched in November 2013 and is a registered 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization. The Refuge is a 21-building labor of love nestled among the Bastrop County pine trees. The Refuge is a long-term, residential, therapeutic community for girls, minors through age 19, who have been rescued out of sex trafficking. Built from the ground up on 50 acres in a beautiful and restorative setting, The Refuge provides trauma-informed, holistic care for the girls on site, including: a University of Texas Charter School program, a medical clinic staffed by community partners and various therapeutic programs uniquely designed for the development of a child survivor. The Refuge, with 48 beds, is the largest long-term, live-in rehabilitation facility for child survivors of sex trafficking in the United States. Statistics show that child sex trafficking is the fastest growing crime in the world and that there was an 846% increase in reported child sex trafficking cases from 2010 to 2015 in the United States alone.
