Sanctuary Building Renovation Begins

(The Good News)

Renovation of our Sanctuary Building restrooms was selected as a high priority capital project at a congregation meeting on February 17, 2019. That was just two years ago, but doesn't it seem like ten years since we had that meeting? We all have a more profound understanding of what Einstein proposed with his general theory of relativity -"massive objects cause a distortion in the space-time continuum."

The COVID-19 pandemic hit the entire USA in early 2020 and the idea for this project lay dormant for several months. In-person indoor worship services were suspended by a vote of the Church Council on March 17, 2020. The church office and buildings were also closed. The church embarked on a live-streaming project to fill the void for worship services. What better time than now to renovate?

As the enormity of coping with the pandemic carried on week after week, we looked ahead that summer with a fundraising campaign along the lines of a Fall school assignment, "what did you do last summer?" As Glenda Morrison often says, "This is a Mighty little church." The results of this campaign proved our collective strength to accomplish our goal.

We selected Qual-Con G.C., LLC construction company to perform the work. Barbara King managed the contractor selection and design input from the church. From October through December our project was under architectural and City of Cedar Park permitting review. The renovation began on February 24, 2021 with the Demolition Phase of the project.

The demolition phase of the renovation job has become much bigger because of our "Attic Pipe Break event." It will now include restoration of water damaged areas of the Sanctuary building. During the peak of the ice storm, we noticed the humidity readings from our Wi-Fi thermostats were rising unexpectedly. While everyone was locked in their homes, Jorge Soto managed to get to the church and looked in the front door, "there is water everywhere." Holy cow! And the bad news just kept coming.

Because there are multiple front lawn water valves and because everything was covered by 3-8" of snow and ice, the initial water shut off attempts were unsuccessful. By 8pm that night Debra and Sergio Longoria had reached out to the City of Cedar Park and waited for a city employee to turn off the city water. Guided by a summer time picture of all the valves in the lawn, Sergio and the city employee finally found the total water shut off valve and turned the water off for good at midnight! Even though the copper pipe feeding the attic hot water heater was insulated, it



split and ran unabated for the better part of 2 days during the coldest part of the storms. City Wide of Austin came the next day to remove much of the debris that had showered down from the ceiling carried by the water and started drying fans.

The insurance adjuster was onsite Friday February 26th. Did we tell you everyone is on long wait lists for every service connected to the historic weather? The adjuster's experienced eye and his measured survey unearthed more extensive damage. We were told to do a two foot "flood cut" to expose <u>all</u> external walls where he measured 90-98%

humidity, largely due to the exterior insulation. Since the water was ³/₄-1.5" everywhere in the building, this was no longer just fix the damage under the waterfall.

In steps Barbara King. Any other normal citizen would still be on hold: "your call is important to us, please stay on the line…" But Barbara performed a miracle: the representative for the remediation company which was to do our much larger water damage remediation arrived just as the insurance adjuster was leaving – they had a key overlap meeting of critical needs and advised us of a much more comprehensive plan to attack the damage. Importantly critical equipment arrived – five De-humidifying machines appeared and are at work as we write.
