# **Building Renovation/Restoration Update**

What began as a noble project to renovate our restrooms and bring them up to new standards and city codes, also morphed into a recovery and reconstruction effort. You may recall the winter storm earlier this year that caused a major water leak and destroyed parts of the church ceiling, the floors, carpet, and walls. The renovation project was set to start the very week of the winter storm. By God's providence, this was stopped. The water leaks destroyed the walls and ceiling of the restrooms before the renovation started, saving us from having to restore newly renovated restrooms. Still, much work had to be done.

For the past four months crews have been working on renovating and restoring everything that was damaged. We now have beautiful new sanctuary tiles, the hole that was on the sanctuary ceiling was repaired along with the air conditioning ducting. We also have beautiful new restrooms, new carpet, a freshly painted sanctuary and narthex, new lighting in the narthex and new kitchen counter tops. Damaged chairs and hymnals have been replaced. A great deal has taken place and we are now close to the end of this project. There are still many little details pending and we are taking care of those as fast as possible. One of those is the reconnection of hot water to both the kitchen and the restrooms. This should be available soon.

Just as you were all praying for this effort, we ask that you please continue to lift this in prayer to bring it to final consummation. Remember all who were involved, from the insurance company, to the cleaning crews, workers, contractors, service providers, and special thanks to Barbara King and Jane Howard for all their dedication to seeing this through.

boat load of limestone rock; I would expect nothing less since I live next to a limestone quarry. The city said we had to get rid of our existing toilets, which we had planned to reuse, and put in new low-flow toilets to meet code – that costs another \$800.

We also made some "I would like changes" called Change Order Notices by the contractor. Who wouldn't want matching kitchen counters? Why would we want to keep a door to nowhere from the altar to the back of a storage room book shelf filled from the closet side with essential items that need to be stored. No one has walked from the altar through that door to the closet in decades. That trench alone has added \$8,000 to the cost of the project. Then we did upgrade to the new wood-look tile floors – everyone on the committee knew that would increase the total cost, but the result is gorgeous.

Altogether we are somewhere between \$10,000 and \$20,000 short on contributed funds to pay for this project and the final invoice from the contractor. So, here's the deal, if you like the outcome of all the storm damage remediation and the restroom renovation, can you consider giving a one-time contribution toward project unexpected costs?

We certainly don't want to get the money by increasing our mortgage, since we are trying to pay that down to nothing. Please help by giving whatever you can (call it an index of gratitude for all the changes offering) and label your gift **Sanctuary Renovation Project**.


# **Network Upgrades Completed**

As our ministries reach out more and more by electronic means, it makes sense to look at improving our network infrastructure. To support this, network hardware upgrades have been made in the sanctuary and multi-ministries buildings. These upgrades were approved by the Trustees and paid for by our Technology Fund. They did not impact our 2021 operating budget.

## **Sanctuary Building Network Upgrades**

During the recent Sanctuary building renovation and remediation work, we took advantage of the fact that the walls in the sanctuary were all torn up due to flooding remediation. What better time to run some more wire and install a few network jacks in a building that was originally built in 1986 before local area hardwired networks were popular?

Here is the plan for the additions which we made:




We already had network jacks in the sanctuary nave and the west end of the youth room. This was from work originally done in 2014 and during the construction of the sound booth in 2020. During this year's building renovation and remediation, we added four more hard-wired network jacks, one each in the narthex and east end of the youth room, plus two in the nursery.

One of the network jacks installed in the nursery is dedicated to a wireless access point which is installed in a window sill there. This extends our Wi-Fi network outside the building allowing us to connect with and manage a possible future electronic road sign to replace our existing fixed main road sign. A Qual-Con subcontractor performed the work. The cost of this addition was about \$690.

## **Multi-Ministries Building Network Upgrades**

The Multi-Ministries building (MMB) was completed in 2005. It was already partially wired for networking with network jacks in the church office, pastor's office and one classroom. There were 10 partially-used spools of Cat5 network cable still stored since original construction in the MMB attic. Why not put this network cable to use by wiring the rest of the MMB for hard-wired network jacks?

Here was the plan approved by the Trustees:



We added five additional duplex network drops: two duplex drops (4 jacks) in the conference room and one duplex jack each in classrooms 2 and 4 and also one duplex jack in the large

classroom at the end of the hall. All of these network jacks were duplex drops, meaning that each drop had two separate network jacks in a single duplex faceplate. We had plenty of leftover Cat5 cable, so our existing cable stock was finally put to use wiring these additional jacks.

## **Lighting Up the Fiber**

In 2014, our hard-wired network had been extended from the MMB to the sanctuary building by constructing an underground conduit containing two Cat5e lines and one fiber line. The fiber line was never activated and lay dormant until now. Part of this year's network upgrade project was to terminate and connect the fiber link to make it useful. This required purchasing equipment (switches and fiber transceivers) capable of connecting fiber as well as regular Cat5e network cable.

The MMB network drops and fiber terminations were completed on June 8 by Cable Com, Inc.



The cost of this portion of the network upgrade was about \$1800, paid for by the Technology Fund administered by the Trustees.

Here is the fiber and Cat5e cable termination point in the Sanctuary nave. It is now hidden behind a curtain (designed and made by Jane Howard) in the northwest corner of the room.

# The Result

The result of all of this network upgrading work is that we now have both hard-wired gigabit LAN and 230Mbps Internet access in all of the church buildings. This goes along with the Wi-Fi network and Internet access which was already being provided by our main router and three wireless access points, two in each building. Our Wi-Fi signal extends beyond the buildings to include the pumpkin patch area and the Memorial outdoor sanctuary.

# **Westlake UMC Water Ministry**

Hello fellow colleagues,

As many of you are aware, for over three years Westlake United Methodist Church has been involved with an ongoing ministry at the Texas border with the asylum seekers. Many of you helped with the initial funding of water for the camp in Matamoros back in May 2019. While the



original project has transitioned and changed, we are still funding water (and other services) in Matamoros.

When we reached out to you in the summer of 2019, we were providing bottled water to the asylum seekers. At that point there were approximately 100 asylum seekers in the camp. That number eventually expanded to over 3,000. Somewhere in the middle of 2020, we transitioned from providing bottled water to a system in which we installed large water tanks and filled those tanks with water transported from the City of Matamoros water treatment plant. We had the water tested repeatedly, and each time the water was deemed potable, but we treated it again once it was on onsite, and we installed heavy-duty filters as an added precaution. This greatly expanded the amount of water we could provide and allowed us to serve many more asylum seekers and to provide water for bathing and laundry.

With the help of many generous people and organizations and by God's never-failing Grace, we continued to provide water until the camp was permanently closed in March 2021. At that time, the US and Mexican governments allowed most of the asylum seekers who were in MPP (the Trump-era program entitled "Migrant Protection Program" which is also known as "remain in Mexico") and still living in the camp to cross into the US. Unfortunately, some asylum seekers who should have been allowed to cross into the US were left behind. The United Nations High Commission for Refugees stepped in and asked Pastor Abraham Barberi (who just happened to be the person who had been coordinating our water project) to open his church in Matamoros to house those asylum seekers. Of course, he agreed and immediately turned his church into a shelter. The original asylum seekers were eventually processed and allowed to cross; yet tens of thousands of asylum seekers are still stranded in Matamoros. Pastor Abraham went from housing approximately 60 asylum seekers to housing more than 300 including many, many women and children. One of the most pressing needs was WATER. He took a crew from his church, and they salvaged some of our water tanks from the old camp and placed them at his church/shelter. We continue to support his work, not only by paying for the transportation of the water but by helping him with the furnishings and food that he needs for those in his care.

But, the story gets worse. When the camp was permanently closed in Matamoros, a new camp sprung up in Reynosa, only about 60 miles away. It is like starting all over. The people in the new camp need everything, including water. Several of the Methodist pastors from Matamoros who

we have partnered with in the past, have reached out to us, begging for help to provide water in Reynosa.

We are not able to fund both of these projects...without your help.

As the temperatures continue to rise and the number of asylum seekers increases, they need water to survive. Currently approximately 1200 asylum seekers are in the camp in Reynosa.

And Reynosa has become incredibly dangerous. Eighteen people (taxi drivers, food workers, and students) were killed on June 19, 2021. The pastors and other volunteers who have worked with and for us are concerned for their safety.

Today we are asking for --

- Financial assistance to help provide water and other needs in Matamoros (\$1,100 monthly)
- Financial assistance to help provide water for the camp in Reynosa (\$1,500 monthly)
- Prayers for our partners in Matamoros and Reynosa
- Prayers for asylum seekers everywhere
- Prayers for our leaders to find a humanitarian response to this crisis

This effort is currently being called the Methodist Water Project, and I've no doubt it will be by water and the Spirit that we shall serve together with our colleagues, and all will experience Christ.
