Posaunenchor 2024 Visit



Once again, as in 2018, we had a visit from the Hamm Mark Posaunenchor (Trombone Choir) from Hamm, Germany. This year there were 24 guests whom we hosted in our homes during their 4-day visit, October 19-22. Posaunenchor played music for both of our worship services, played a 90-minute concert at Solea on Sunday the 20th, played a 15-minute serenade for A Child's Haven parents and students and then toured downtown Austin and the state capitol on Monday the 21st, with lunch at Chuy's Barton Springs, before their 9am departure on Tuesday the 22nd. We also had a 49-minute presentation about Hamm by Markus Wesselmann during the potluck lunch on Sunday.

The Posaunenchor visit was organized by Neil and Jane Howard who have been friends with these Germans for about 35 years. However, the majority of the hosting effort was provided

2024 STEWARDSHIP APPEAL BEGINS NOVEMBER 10

Giving Moments will be offered in worship during the last three Sundays of November, as a part of our annual stewardship campaign. It's called "stewardship," because of Jesus' stories about stewards in the Bible. A steward is charged by the master with caring for the master's

property. The master owns the property, but the steward is responsible for it and accountable to the master. Jesus says it is the same between God and us. Everything we have — our time, talents, and financial resources — are gifts from God. We are called to be good stewards of these gifts and to give back generously.

About 75 percent of Cedar Park's annual budget is supported by pledges. Pledging enables the Church to plan its programs and budget. Pledging can seem scary. How do we know that we can fulfill that annual commitment? While it is important to fulfill a pledge, the Church understands that changed circumstances can make that difficult. You only need to inform the Church, if some unforeseen event prevents you from fulfilling your pledge.

Over the next few weeks, think about what God and our Church has given you. Pray about what is an appropriate response to God's

generosity. Saint Paul famously said about giving: "Each must do as he has made up his mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion . . ." (2 Corinthians 9:7). So whatever you give, and whether you pledge or give in some other way, the Church will be grateful, and you will be blessed.

This year's stewardship campaign concludes on November 24th, Commitment Sunday. Please prayerfully consider what you can give for 2025 and be prepared to return your pledge card that Sunday, or before.

The Church had another good month financially in September. Donations for the month were a little above our monthly estimates and expenses were close to our budgeted estimates. We also had some Pumpkin Patch income in September. As a result we had net income of almost \$4,100 for the month. However, we are still running a small deficit for the year. Most of our Pumpkin Patch income will show up in our October statements so we should have positive net income at the end of October. The Church continues to have adequate reserves to meet our financial obligations.

United Women in Faith Advent Project

The next UWF quarterly meeting is Saturday, November 9th at 9:30 am. We will be doing a hands-on Christmas mission project and discussing how to prepare our hearts and find peace in the joy and chaos of the holiday season.

We have two wonderful programs we are supporting that are consistent with our mission to be in loving outreach to women, children and youth:

- Head Start is the federally funded free daycare program for ages birth through five for families meeting the federal low-income guidelines. We are supporting the program in Leander, which covers Cedar Park, Leander and Liberty Hill. It currently serves 66
 - children with 100+ on the waiting list. UWF previously supported teen moms through Acts of Love, which has been folded into Head Start.
- Yesterday's Gone is the transitional housing and support program for women in our area who have suffered trauma or abuse.

We are providing gift cards for families in these programs this year. If you would like to donate, you can make a monetary donation in the offering basket labeled "UWF Christmas Mission" or place gift



cards of \$10, \$15, or \$20 from HEB, Walmart or Target in the UWF jar in the Narthex. We will be collecting donations and gift cards through December 8th.

Please join us on November 9th as we gather in fellowship as women of the church support these important ministries in our community.

Trustees Report November

It is the Trustees job to keep the CPFUMC buildings and property healthy and in good working order. The Trustees also have a role in the financial health and sustainability of the Church. We do that through good operational planning, preventive maintenance, and spending every dollar of your donations wisely. We also have a role in encouraging the congregation to increase donations to meet our spending budget. We usually encourage an increase in giving of at least 3-5%, to keep up with inflation. I will be standing in front of you again in early November making this request. Our little Church is in a very healthy physical and financial condition--we just want to keep it that way.

Thanks to everyone who has given to our new Trees and Grounds Fund. This has helped pay for the major trimming Good Guys Tree Service did for us a couple months ago. But our little Church forest has an appetite and constantly needs nourishment. The Trees and Ground Fund helps us look after our Church Forest which numbers at least 50 beautiful trees on our 6.3 acres. A \$100-\$250 donation every year would be greatly appreciated. Also stay tuned to how we will use some of these monies to construct a natural walkway through our heavily wooded back 3 acres so we can connect with a new walkway from the new Cedar Park library opening November 1. This is a project we will try to do as much as possible with our own labor. Hopefully by mid-year 2025 you can walk 6 blocks back through our CPFUMC walkway and right to the front door of the new library. It should make for some exciting field trips for our ACH students and Church Groups of all ages. This can be our new Zen Walking Memorial Trail.
