A Conversation with Anita Rizley:

- Q: When was your first day at CPFUMC and what do you remember about it?
- A: I started attending CPFUMC in 2024 after watching the online service for several months. However, in the mid 1990's I lived a short while on Nameless Road and I attended a service here with my mother. Shortly thereafter, she and I moved to NW Austin interrupting our attendance here.
- Q: Tell us about what drew you to CPFUMC.
- A: After moving to Cedar Park I drove past CPFUMC almost daily. I noticed several happenings that sparked happy remembrances from other churches I had been involved with, such as the Pumpkin Patch, A Child's Haven, and Sunday morning comings and goings. Having been raised a Methodist I felt a tug to visit and my goodness I am happy I did! I felt an immediate welcome.
- Q: In what city did you grow up? Where do you live now?
- A: My formative years K-12 were lived in four states; Oklahoma, Iowa, Minnesota, and Nebraska. My father worked with Northern Natural Gas Company when about half of today's existing pipelines were built in the 1950's and the 1960's. This took me to 4 elementary schools, 2 middle schools, and 3 high schools. My



BE LIGHT YOUTH Worship Sunday: Psalm 23

September 28, 2025

Psalm 23:1 Karen

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.

As I study the Book of Psalm, I once read that Psalm opens with a choice - to walk our own way in life or walk God's way. If you pick God's way, Psalms can become God's given road map as His road leads to life. As you listen to our sermon today, you can keep this in mind to see how God's words bring you life.

Psalm 23:1 "The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want."

Said in many stories in the Bible, the Lord is seen as our Shepherd. Sheep need many things - food, care, help, affection. A shepherd provides the needs of the sheep and keeps them safe. We, the children of God, resemble the sheep, while God resembles the shepherd. He takes care of us, giving protection over us, and giving us what we need. Though we live in a world which can certainly make us feel like we need to have a certain something to be happy, like the new phone that comes out or new clothes, this verse tells us that when we have God, we have all that we need. Take note that what we need might not be what we want or even what we think we need. God gives us what we actually need, and we can trust Him as He can see the whole picture and His plans are significantly better than ours. Through the ups and downs of life, God is with us, giving everything we could ever need.

Psalm 23:2 He makes me lie down in green pastures.

He leads me beside still waters.

Sometimes I get anxious because life feels too fast, like I can't keep up. I worry about what people think of me, I worry a lot about my grades to make sure that my grades are good and ever since I started 7th grade I have been getting tested for a learning disability and I have been anxious because I don't know what is wrong with my learning disability and what I have.

But then I remember: "He makes me lie down in green pastures; He leads me beside still waters."

It's like God knows exactly when I'm at my breaking point. He doesn't ask me to fix everything—I feel Him leading me to rest, to breathe, to let go of the weight I'm carrying. The green pastures remind me there's still beauty in the world, even when I feel overwhelmed. The still waters remind me that peace is real, when the water is still and you're lying next to God or whoever just remember that God is always with you.

Psalm 23:3 Kevin

He restores my soul. He leads me in paths of righteousness for His name's sake.

It's a simple verse, but it carries a quiet kind of power. The word "restores" suggests something has been worn down or broken. And rather than discard it, God chooses to renew it. Not just emotions, not just energy, but the soul, the core of who a person is. That kind of restoration goes beyond self-help or temporary relief; it's deep, quiet work that only God can do. And after restoring, He doesn't leave us standing still; He leads. Not aimlessly, but with direction and purpose, guiding us in ways that are right, even if not always easy. And He does it not because we've earned it or deserve it, but for His name's sake; because it's simply who He is. In a world that often leaves people spiritually tired or morally disoriented, this verse offers clarity: the God who restores also redirects, not for our credit, but as a reflection of His character: steady, faithful, and good.

Psalm 23: 4 Leland

Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil because you are with me. Your rod and your staff comfort me.

This verse brings a message that God is always with us, and we don't need to be afraid when someone dies, something happens to someone we care about, or when things don't go as planned for us or someone we know. Remember that God is there, and everything will be okay because He loves and cares for us.

Psalm 23:5 Josie

You Prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows

I think this line has a lot of different meanings to it, when I hear, "you prepare a table before me," I think of communion, and "my cup overflows" I think about communion for that too because, the cup that has the juice, is overflowing with his 'blood' that he gave to us. He prepares the table before of us with his 'body' that he gave to us too. For "you anoint my head with oil," I think of Ash Wednesday when we get our heads anointed with oil.

Psalm 23:6 Karen

"Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the Lord forever."

The love of God - 'Agape' - is the highest form of love. It is the unconditional and unfailing love God gives us everyday. It is the type of love that is not based on who we are, like how good we do something or what we do, but is based on who He is. He loves us, in a way no one else can for He is love. This Psalm really encapsulates this as it can be seen from all of the verses.

In the 1st verse, we can see how God loves us so much as He gives us all we need, like a Shepherd to a sheep. He takes care of us, gives us food, care, help, and affection. When we have God, we have all that we need, for His love is sufficient.

From the 2nd verse explained by Kinsley, we can see how God gives us peace. He knows when we need a break from the world, and He gives us this. Kinsley also explained how the green pastures reminded her of the beauty in the world. This is one of the ways you can see the goodness and mercy following us in our lives, by taking a moment to look at nature and be reminded of peace when you see God's beautiful creations.

From the explanation of verse 3 given by Kevin, he points out how God restores and redirects our soul, not for us, but as a reflection of His character. This is an amazing symbol of 'agape'. The way he loves us so much that He helps us when we are broken, not because we are entitled to His help, but because He is a loving God.

From the 4th verse explained by Leland where he explained how we don't need to worry when things don't go our way, we can see the love of God as He is the one who makes plans for us, which we can always trust because we know that everything He does is planted in love.

The 5th verse explained by Josie, where she tied in the verse with the idea of communion, showcases one of the best examples of 'agape'. Communion represents the body and blood of Christ, and acts as a remembrance of what God did for us. For God loves us so so so very much, that He gave His amazing Son to save us. This action shows how unconditional God's love is and how far His goodness goes.

The 6th verse really ties it all together as it is ended on the note of how we can always see goodness and mercy everywhere, just like how we saw it in each verse of this Psalm. Now just imagine how much can be seen in the Book of Psalm, or even the whole Bible.

It's a great reminder that through the good and bad of life, God is always protecting us and is giving us goodness and blessings. To end this sermon, I'll leave you with a reminder: Whatever you go through in life, always remember that God, the God who loves you so very much and unconditionally, is there, right by your side.

OCTOBER 5TH IS WORLD COMMUNION/UMCOR SUNDAY

On October 5th, the first Sunday in October, CPFUMC and other United Methodist congregations will join many Christian churches across the globe in celebrating World Communion Sunday. World Communion Sunday began as World-Wide Communion Sunday at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburg, Pennsylvania in 1933. The Rev. Hugh Thompson Kerr and his congregation sought to demonstrate the interconnectedness of Christian churches, regardless of denomination.

On October 5th, followers of Jesus Christ in large churches and small, on farms and in cities, in ornate buildings and under tents, will gather to receive the bread and cup of Holy Communion. Some will receive cubes of bread. Some will tear from a common loaf. Some will receive a wafer. Some will drink from a common chalice. Some will dip a piece of bread into the cup. Some will have individual glasses. Some will use wine; some juice. Some will offer both. Pastors will lead a variety of liturgies, in many languages. Clergy will dress traditionally, formally, and casually. Despite the differences in our denominations and traditions, we will all be celebrating our unity in Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior.

World Communion Sunday continues to be a special giving Sunday. This year we will be collecting money for the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR). Through UMCOR's efforts around the world, we are making a difference in the lives of communities and individuals whose lives have been upended by storms, wars, displacement, and hunger.
